PARSON- -TO- PERSON

"⁸So the women hurried away from the tomb, afraid yet filled with joy, and ran to tell his disciples. ⁹Suddenly Jesus met them. "Greetings," he said. They came to him, clasped his feet and worshiped him. ¹⁰Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid. Go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me." (Matthew 28:8-10)

The women "hurried on their way," and ran smack into Jesus. The two Marys hit the brakes — and they may have started screaming or been struck dumb with fear. Remember, they'd been to a tomb. Think of your reaction to visiting a cemetery only to discover the headstone of your loved one overturned, someone whom you had watched suffer and die, and then, as you're running away confused and frightened, you bump into the deceased, who now does not appear to be deceased!

You can imagine the flood of emotions that must have washed over these women, causing their bodies to shudder from head to foot. The fact that they take hold of his feet shows us that he's a real person, not a ghost or a spirit. He is someone they can see, hear, touch, hold and connect with, like anyone else they would meet as they wander down the road.

If you are driving down the road and encounter a boulder obstructing your path, you'll need to change directions or have a collision. That is what the resurrection does: It forces us to slow down and change directions. All too often, we keep trying to plow our way past the resurrection by proceeding as though there is nothing there at all.

"I'm going to carry this burden myself," we say. "It's mine to bear." "I'm going to stay with this guilt a while longer — getting used to it now." "I'm not about to forgive her, no matter what she does. She done me wrong." "If there was a God, then my suffering would not have happened."

And so it goes, as we slam into the resurrection rock getting nowhere at all. This is not a call to slow down or simplify our lifestyle. It's not about stopping to smell the roses, or the coffee or a ham dinner. It is about slowing down to reflect on the events of Easter. Like Mary and Mary, we are invited to come to Jesus, take hold of his feet and worship him. To the two Mary's, he says, "Go and tell." There are a multitude of missions to be carried out in the name of Jesus, and the challenge for us, as it was for the two Marys on that very first Easter, is to listen — listen to what Jesus is challenging us to do.

Perhaps Christ is calling you to fix a friendship that has been broken by a cruel or thoughtless act on your part, or to forgive a relative who hurt you very badly and strained your relationship to the breaking point.

Listen for what is being said to you. Listen for what you are being asked to do. After all, we're supposed to be on a "walk with Jesus," aren't we? No one ever talks about their "run with Jesus."

FAREWELL, MY FRIENDS

For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the LORD, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope. (Jeremiah 29:11)

We cannot always see clearly into the future, or what blessing may await us there. When the prophet Jeremiah spoke these words to the ancient Israelites, they were in exile in Babylon, far from home. Jeremiah was calling them to live into the future that was yet to be: Find a place to live. Plant a garden. Raise a family. In other words, even in this strange new place, remember the things you did before, the things that made you distinctively who you are. Make the best of it by keeping faith in this ambiguous, uncertain world.

Here's the paradox of what lies ahead both for Scotch Presbyterian Church and the Rev. Rich Hinkle. This may be the most important part of all. *As we think of our future, it's not about us!*

I recall the words of Rev. Dawn Carder, a seminary classmate of mine, when she preached the sermon the day I was installed as pastor of First Presbyterian Church, Ponca, Nebraska, "The congregation may think they chose to call Rich as pastor; and Rich may truly believe he has chosen to come here a pastor; but here is the Gospel truth, 'It is all God's doing, it is part of God's plan for the church and Rich."

Those words rang true then in June of 1994 and they ring just as true in April of 2021. We live and move and have our being in God and God's future. And that is a future over which none of us have total control. (If you have confidence in the ability of human beings to completely control the future, just think back to a year ago.)

This passage from Jeremiah reminds us that God's vision for the future may be quite different than our own. Just prior to verse 11 above, Jeremiah spoke these words from God to a people in exile: But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare. (verse 7)

Can you imagine what a stunning word that was to the people in exile? Pray for your enemies, the ones who dragged you out kicking and screaming? Pray for this foreign land, the one that you would much rather despise? Pray for this city where you do not want to live? Seriously?

Yes, God says. Seriously.

We are to pray for the world in which we find ourselves. Not for it to be the way we want it to be for our own sake, but for the sake of the people as they are. This is not about our own survival. This is about what God is doing in the world, and the role we have to play.

In many ways, the state of the Christian church in the United States brings to mind a sinking ship. Perhaps is does; perhaps it doesn't. But if it does seem a grim situation, ponder these words of the Rev. Magrey deVega, senior pastor of Hyde Park United Methodist Church, Tampa.

"Well, maybe the church isn't a sinking ship, as much as it is God's way of transforming it into a submarine."

We will never return to 'normal'; but we do have a future filled with hope as we embrace the wonderful, liberating oddity of being Christians, of following Jesus in a life more challenging and adventuresome than we can possibility imagine.

May we all continue to discover who we are and who God made us to be. Peace my friends,
