Alleluia! Christ is risen. **He is risen indeed. Alleluia!**

These words will be part of our call to worship on Easter Sunday and throughout the season of Easter. It truly is not just a day, but a season of Alleluia. Matthew 22:29-33 finds Jesus with the Sadducees (powerful, aristocratic priests often hostile to the Pharisees, but whom Matthew lumps into one large unified group to entrap Jesus) and enlightening them on the resurrection to come. The Sadducees didn't believe in the resurrection and a theological disagreement was

set to trap Jesus. Yet in the debate Jesus turns their thinking on end and enlightens them with facts; a lack of knowledge over Scripture and the power of God. Jesus then goes on in verse 31-32 to say who he is and open Scripture to them. And as for the resurrection of the dead, have you not read what was said to you by God, 'I am the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob'? He is God not of the dead, but of the living.'

If we are being honest and open to Scripture, we find the season of Easter does indeed turn us upside down. We move during Holy week from the shouting and waving of Palms proclaiming Jesus to an upper room where one betrays, to a fire where one denies, to a cross that for all we read in Scripture, seems to lack the majority of disciples. I often wonder if they are perhaps on the fringes looking on. All of this rejection, suffering, betrayal, denial, and hanging on the fringes culminate in Jesus' death on that cross of crucifixion and the placement of his body in an empty tomb. It feels like the end of the story. But we need to remember like Jesus' disciples what Jesus said. Jesus foreshadowed three times what was to be; resurrection! He just said to the Sadducees also *He is God not of the dead, but of the living.* All four gospels bear witness to the resurrection; the power of God. This indeed is good news as Mary rushes to tell the other followers of Jesus.

As we conclude the season of Lent and move into the season of Easter, may our proclamations be loud and clear as our voices ring out to share this good news. If you've not grabbed up a copy of the book *The Coming Glory: Hope Now for Life After Death* by Paul Swets I encourage you to do so. The books are located in the Chapel on the bookcase before you enter the sanctuary and they are free. Our hope in our salvation in Jesus, our receiving Jesus as Savior, is both eternal life and the resurrection to come.

Wishing you great joy and blessing in this Easter season.



Installation

You may be wondering over this word installation and its meaning in the life of the church. Why do Pastor's get installed while others may be under contract or supply? To install means to put into place, insert, attach, even consecrate or inaugurate. Jesus himself once baptized, shows up in the synagogue of his hometown and gives an inaugural address in Luke 4:18-19 'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour.' At the beginning of Jesus' ministry he establishes his presence in God and by the Holy Spirit on what it is he's not only come to do, but also proclaim. Jesus foreshadows in his address to the synagogue his fulfillment of Scripture. He tells those gathered his future actions and words as the one sent by God to do these things.

Holding this Scripture in one hand we turn to the Church. With Jesus as the head of the Church, we the congregation along with all congregations and all our brothers and sisters in Christ are the body. Pastors are called to shepherd and lead the Church not as an individual, but in tandem (parity of office) with the Session's Ruling Elders who've been elected, ordained and installed (put into place) in the life of the church to carry out the missions and ministries of the church following God's will, in the name of Jesus, and by the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

By the Book of Order of the P.C. (U.S.A.) churches install pastors. The installation of a pastor, much like that of Elders doesn't happen in isolation, but in community. The Presbytery, who maintains oversight of all the churches in its geographical region, gathers with the calling Church to install a pastor as together vows are made by both the Presbytery and the installing congregation. For the congregation, a renewed covenant with God is made to be guided by the pastor, along with praying for, encouraging, respecting, and following the pastor's guidance in serving Christ. In addition to offering spiritual support and care, the congregation also offers care for the pastor's welfare financially, to stand by in times of both joy and hardship, to receive God's Word and Biblical instruction and to welcome pastoral care as the pastor seeks to serve God, guided by the Holy Spirit, and as a disciple of Jesus [B.O. p. 105, W-4.04a-c].

Indeed, Pastor Betsy has been called by this church to come and serve among us; to be our shepherd, and the pastoral presence for us and our community. On June 26, 2022 at 3:00 p.m. we will gather as Scotch Presbyterian Church, along with neighbors, friends, and the Presbytery of Northern New York to install Pastor Betsy as our Pastor. The congregation is invited to this special worship service (morning worship will be postponed and replaced with this installation service) and the meal after, as together we celebrate our renewed covenant with God to serve in the name of Jesus and by the Holy Spirit to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ in our region of the North Country.



Family Easter Activity






At our March 14th Session meeting, our Covid protocols were reviewed and decided that
